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Adult Ed. Classes with Charlie Schmidtke Study Notes: "Mary/Elizabeth and Jesus/John"

Part I: Background Information

Any study of Jesus should look at who his family was or may have been. To start that process we'll examine: 1) the relationship between Mary (his mother) and Elizabeth (possibly a relative) and 2) Jesus and John the Baptist when they were young. Luke is the only gospel that gives us an account of the relationships among Mary and Elizabeth and of Jesus and John. On the other hand, all the gospels start Jesus' adult life with his baptism by John. The gospel of John has the beautifully poetic opening, but his narrative starts with the Baptist. Matthew gives us Jesus' childhood ending with their eventual return to Nazareth after staying in Egypt. After that he goes immediately to Jesus' baptism by John. Mark starts with John the Baptist and Jesus' baptism. Luke is quite different. We'll examine his telling about Elizabeth, Mary's visit to her, and John's birth. Later we'll also cover Luke's story about Jesus being found in the temple when he was 12. Luke goes to Jesus' baptism immediately following that story. I believe these stories in Luke were important for his entire narrative found in both the gospel and the book of Acts. He wrote both books to elevate Jesus as our Savior and Paul as the one who brought the gospel to the world. He briefly mentions some of the work of the apostles, but the Acts is really misnamed: I don't really think it is the Acts of the Apostles, rather it's the Acts of Paul with some mention of some of the apostles. Paul is baptizing in Jesus' name and is following in the tradition of John the Baptist and Jesus. Luke gives us stories that are important about Jesus' childhood and we'll examine the relationship of John and Jesus before Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River.

We tend to look at the bible as a spiritual and historical account of God in the Old Testament (OT) and of Jesus in the New Testament (NT). Reading the bible historically, that is, looking for facts and the truth about the past is problematic. The bible comes out of an oral culture, meaning the gospels were written decades after the events occurred and nothing was written before Paul's letters. His letters had limited audiences for the first 100 years or so. Thus, the faithful became followers and baptized because of the oral stories being passed on by the apostles and the other faithful (especially the women). Looking for historical accuracy in an oral tradition is looking at the wrong starting point. This oral tradition became a primary source for all the written gospels, whether they were included in the NT or not. Oral traditions use stories to pass on wisdom, lessons and what is most important in life (meaning and purpose). It's about meaning and understanding, not about verifying facts and analyzing evidence. We tend to gravitate to the "real" and "factual." How often do you say aloud or think to yourself whether or not a movie or TV show is based on a "true" story? If it's a good story, does it matter? It usually does though. That is a cultural bias that favors facts and evidence and minimizes meaning and purpose. So, if we are going to be fair, we're going to have to be careful about our questions about fact and evidence and listen more to the meanings of the stories. However, I have a real paradox here. I'm going to try to provide you with "cultural" facts and evidence to help us understand the meanings of the stories. I think facts and evidence should not overturn the stories' meanings or purpose, but hopefully can help us understand it better. Our focus remains on the humanity of Jesus and the people around him.

So, we'll start with an overview. There are a lot of scholarly debates about what I'll be presenting. I'll try to provide a consensus view that makes some sense out of Jesus' family. Mary's parents were probably Anne and Joachim and probably died when Mary was a child. According to the custom of the times, when her parents died, she would have become a ward of the temple. One of the most likely explanations for her childhood was that Zechariah (sometimes spelled Zachariah) becomes her guardian. He worked in the temple and was married to Elizabeth. So, Mary and Elizabeth would become close as Mary grows up in the temple. Another story line is that Anne and Joachim do not die when Mary was a child; rather, they move to Nazareth and raise Mary there. This story line makes the betrothal to Joseph and her trip from Nazareth to Elizabeth more consistent. We'll turn to this story line in a minute. Elizabeth and Zechariah had no children until later in life (maybe she in her 40s, Zechariah in his 50s). Their child is John the Baptist. Zechariah could have divorced Elizabeth if she had no child after ten years of marriage. It is the woman's responsibility to get pregnant and having children was the primary purpose of marriage. But he doesn't divorce her. [Read: Luke 1:5-25]

Zechariah was a priest from the tribe of Levi and Elizabeth was a descendent of Aaron. Moses' brother who was the first priest for the people in Cana. David established the roles of the family lines and the Levites would serve as priests. The priests would cast lots to determine who would go into the altar. There are two altars in the temple. The first altar was called the Golden or incense altar. A veil separated the incense altar from the Holy of Holies. The Holy of Holies held the Ark of the Covenant and only the High Priest could enter this area. Jews believed that God was physically present with the ark. The Incense altar was built of acacia wood and covered with gold. It had four horns, one at each corner. similar to the altar of sacrifice in the courtvard. The incense was burned twice daily, morning and evening (since the time of Aaron). When the Babylonians destroyed the temple and took people into captivity, this practice was lost for over 70 years before the temple was replaced with the help of the Persians. Ethiopian Jews claim to have secreted the first/real ark of the covenant after the temple's destruction and have it protected in a special temple in Ethiopia; this place still exists today.

There was a special family line who had the proper recipe for the incense (which included salt—a precious commodity). This offering symbolized that the prayers of the people were rising up to God. Animal sacrifices occurred outside on the courtyard altars and were for atonement (after which people would be able to commune with God—the basis for our Eucharistic practice). Luke's passage is about Zechariah's experience when he is chosen to burn the incense which is a real honor. Scholars believe about 8,000 people may have been outside the temple when Zechariah's story occurs. There were always large crowds around the temple, using the pools surrounding it, seeking rabbis for advice, offering sacrifices for loved ones, etc. We'll continue the story of Elizabeth and Zechariah next month.
