Adult Ed. Classes with Charlie Schmidtke— Study Notes on Hinduism (Part III)

This completes the three-part series on Hinduism. [Classes will resume on Monday, January 17, 2022 when the group begins its discussion of Judaism. All are invited to attend in-church or on Zoom. The schedule appears elsewhere in this issue.]

Hinduism—Part III

The Gospel of Thomas and his life story are important elements for the Indian Christians. We rarely hear about his gospel and his life, other than he is referred to by John as the Doubter. Some of the details that follow have been corroborated by researchers; others are matters of belief. The Gospel of Thomas was written by his disciples (sometime between 60-250 AD). They believed in the Hindu Jesus and Thomas was their leader. It is also referred to as the Coptic Gospel of Thomas. A copy was found near Nag Hammadi (Egypt) in 1945 with other "lost gospels." Thomas in our gospels was called Didymus, meaning he was a twin. Scholars and theologians have debated who his twin may have been. The most common belief was that he and St. Jude (another apostle) were twins. In India many of Jesus' followers believed that Jesus and Thomas were twins. There are books and records in India that give sightings of Jesus in India after his resurrection. There are also passages saying that Thomas and Jesus were often mistaken for one another.

There is general agreement that Thomas stayed in Jerusalem, maybe eight years, then he went to Syria, Persia and ended up in India. He started in the northwest, now Pakistan, and moved to the southwest. He studied with Jesus while both were in India and learned the Dharma and Hindu ways. Legend says that one proof that they were twins happened when Mary was dying in Ephesus (where John had taken her). Thomas received an inner call that Mary was dying. He immediately went to Ephesus, arriving three days too late. He went to her tomb and Mary's radiant living body emerged from the stone sepulcher and she ascended to heaven (Catholics celebrate this as Mary's Assumption). Thomas cried out imploring her not to leave. She looked upon him with tenderness and took the belt from her waist that she habitually wore and threw it down to him with words of blessing. After his experience with Mary, Thomas went to Qumran and persuaded some Essenes to go to India with him. Many did. In the 20th century excavations in southern India where Thomas died have found coins from Qumran dated to the first century.

Thomas was killed sometime around 72 AD. The earth around his tomb was the sight of many miracles. In 1292 Marco Polo visited the site and took some of the red-colored earth. Upon his return to Venice, he healed many people with the earth. In the 16th century, the pope summoned clergy and laymen who were followers of Thomas and Jesus. He asked them to bring their sacred liturgical and theological texts. The pope surrounded them with soldiers and confiscated all the material and burned it in front of them. This event is a primary reason why there are so many gaps in our history of Thomas and Christianity in India. There were books of magic and healing among them also. An Archbishop from Portugal sent soldiers to "convert the pagans" in the area of Thomas' ministry. They went house to house to destroy any books they found. They also destroyed the books of astrology used by the priests who followed Thomas. The Portuguese Archbishop also demanded that Thomas' followers stop Hindu practices and conform to Western standards of Christianity. Thus, what was once a thriving Hindu Christian community became dismembered and only a small number of Syriac followers remain (from Syria to India). In the 19th century, Saint Greforios helped restore Jesus Hinduism and St. Thomas' Christian Church in southern India. The primary beliefs for Indian Christians were:

- The traditions of Thomas and Jesus are intact in practices of Dharma and Yoga.
- Jesus was born a man and became God—this is consistent with Hindu belief and practices.
- Their theology is one of Wisdom, not of salvation on the cross.
- Redemption comes from within, not from the outside; from inner wisdom, not from crucifixion.
- Jesus is the inner voice of mystery and the self.
- The cross was a way to get rid of the body, not salvation from sin.

Thomas was mystical and he saw God's kingdom as the sacred place between alpha and omega. His gospel is synchronic, not a narrative like our gospels. It contains the sayings, questions and teachings of Jesus (with no miracles) and connected by their meanings, not chronology or history. Questions may be answered in later sayings, which illustrates the inner meaning and connectedness of truth. Truth can never be found in the material world of space and time.

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
