TLC at TOL Respite Care Program

This will be our last article, which results from our decision to resign as Co-coordinators of the *TLC at TOL* Respite Care Program and to indefinitely suspend the program as of December 31, 2020. Ensuring the health and safety of our guests and volunteers was our top priority and we did not believe it was possible to meet COVID-19 guidelines. The uncertainty of when we would be able to resume our activities was another consideration.

Sue Wloch created the program in November 2014 with available seed money and a grant from Erie County Senior Services. We extend our *heartfelt* thanks to Sue for having the confidence and faith in us to carry on following her departure. It has been a blessing for us to co-coordinate and share the responsibilities in preparation each month.

We will remember greeting the caregivers and their loved ones as they arrived each month—sharing many smiles! We are thankful for our guests and their



caregivers—a blessing—and we enjoyed getting to know them and spending time with them over the years. We can't say enough about all of the volunteers and what they meant to the program—they too are a blessing! We also enjoyed chair yoga time with Leanne Oldenbrook, as

well as visits from therapy dogs (many were from the SPCA "Paws of Love" program)—and we were happy to share monthly updates on our activities with readers of the *Trinity Tidings*.

It has been a pleasure to serve the caregivers in our community and their loved ones. As we remember the good times, we also fondly remember the guests that needed to leave the program and the passing of current and former guests. What a blessing to have known all of them through *TLC at TOL*.

We are also grateful for the financial support and associations with Lutheran Charities of WNY, the Lutheran Foundation and the Alzheimer's Association WNY Chapter. Thank you to all who have supported *TLC at TOL* and we ask that you keep our Respite families and all caregivers in prayer.

As the program concludes, we are blessed to carry wonderful memories of this very special ministry and are thankful for the opportunity we had to share our thoughts with the congregation on Respite Recognition Sunday, November 15.

Charlie Schmidtke's New Book! (Part 1)



"My I's: Isms, Ignorance, Interrelationships and Insights."

The phrase "An unexamined life is not worth living" is a truism that became a guide for Charlie Schmidtke's journey of self-reflection. His book is a unique mashup of memoir combined with philosophical reflections on life, cast within the topics of race, religion, gender, generations, and grief.

In an exploration that spans decades, he tells of encounters with Jim Crow, journeys through religious transformation, shifts from a male dominant lifestyle to a more balanced view of gender roles, wanders through generations, confronts profound tragedies, deaths, and grief, and encounters those who have blessed his life in ordinary as well as extraordinary ways. He looks specifically at the isms he himself has confronted, along with the social context that has pervaded his experiences. This highly personal narrative reflects how his attitude, language, and behavior have changed and become more inclusive, tolerant, and accepting. His stories range from light-hearted to serious and from amusing to introspective.
