Pastor's Ponderings

"Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it." Hebrews 13:1-2

Hospitality is a challenge... to open one's door to a stranger and maybe be confronted with something new, and something not of our prior experiences, and to learn and grow from these encounters.

How do we welcome the stranger today?

Hospitality is a giving ministry. Giving of our time, our listening ears, our compassion and sometimes shelving judgment for a time or forever. It is a process of opening-up and building relationships, and getting to know each person's story. Hospitality follows the golden rule, "in everything do to others as you would have them do to you" Matthew 7:12.

We are very excited to announce TOL has been approved as a partner in The Goodness Project. Its vision lines up with ours in helping as many people as we can through community efforts. The website tells the inspiring story of Bill and Rachel Fletcher and how they started something out of nothing—except with the faith and determination—to feed the working poor and help their community (<u>https://thegoodnessproject.com</u>). Today there are five locations: Fort Worth, TX, Nashville, TN, Buffalo NY, Toronto, Canada and Israel.

We can now go "shopping" for our church projects at the warehouse, 1500 Clinton Street in Buffalo, for items ranging from personal care items, non-perishable food, clothes, household goods, toys, furniture, office supplies and so many other things. The corporate partners are constantly sending trucks to replenish the items. The prices are very nominal and they have "box" specials that you can fill a whole box for a flat rate. The first time I went as a guest of another church and just walked around looking—I was amazed. We filled box after box of items that they used to make up holiday gift boxes for many families—and a little money went a long way.

Part II: Matthew's Nativity Story

Here's a brief summary of Matthew's nativity story.

- <u>Chapter 1:1-17</u>—Lists Jesus' ancestors
- <u>Chapter 1:18-24</u>—Jesus' birth: Joseph has a dream to wed Mary who was pregnant and name the child Emmanuel meaning "God is with us." The birth just states that Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea.
- <u>Chapter 2:1-12</u>—Story of Wise men
- <u>Chapter 2:13-23</u>—Escape to Egypt; the killing of innocent children; and the family's return from Egypt after Joseph has a dream. There are no details of the stay in Egypt nor for how long.

Neither Matthew nor Luke was there, so how did they get the information for their stories? Did Mary talk to them? Did she ever meet Luke or Paul (highly unlikely) or even Matthew? Why are their stories so different? There were 50-70 years of oral tradition before any of the gospels were written (Mark's was probably the first). Matthew's story covers over two years after the Nativity, while Luke is about eight days. In Matthew we see that Mary and Joseph settle in Bethlehem for at least a year. They have to escape to Egypt because of Herod. They were warned to escape in a dream of Joseph's and warnings from the magi. In Luke after Jesus' circumcision, they moved back to Nazareth. Did they go to Egypt like Matthew says or go directly home to Nazareth as Luke says?

Who was Matthew

His name was Levi. Jesus may have changed his name to Matthew (just like we have nicknames). Mark and Luke identify him as Levi. Or his name was Matthew and he was from the tribe of Levi (an important tribe in Judaism), so his nickname may have been Levi. He was a tax collector who would have been required to be fluent in Hebrew and Aramaic in order to communicate with others. He was probably from Capernaum (maybe he worked on import/export taxation).

Matthew is not mentioned after Pentecost but scholars believe he was martyred around 60 CE at Nadabah in Ethiopia. He may have been one of the followers who stayed in Jerusalem with Peter, James and John and maybe returned to Galilee now and then before going to Ethiopia. He may have been the brother of James the lesser, the apostle who was the son of Alphaeus. The Apostle Thaddaeus may also have been a brother to Matthew and/or James.

Who wrote Matthew? It was written in Greek and there is no indication that Matthew would have been fluent in Greek. So, it is most likely that disciples of Matthew wrote it and used his name for credibility. The Q document was a collection of Jesus' speeches and parables and may have been the basis for all the Gospel writers. We'll look at the Q documents later. Some scholars believe that Matthew's sermons or memoirs were the source for the Q document. Did Mark who wrote the first Gospel use the Q document? These are questions that are hotly debated among theologians and biblical scholars. I didn't try to answer these questions in the class.

Matthew's gospel passages focus upon non-Jews participating in the nativity story. The Magi were from another country, practiced a different religion, and represent gift giving to honor Jesus. The Epiphany was first celebrated in the Eastern Orthodox Church. Epiphany actually means manifestation or appearance. As with Saturnalia and December 25, the date of Epiphany, January 6, has its roots in a celebration of the Greek god of wine, Dionysius. Some of the practices became mixed with the Orthodox Church's celebration. Epiphany became known as the 12th day of Christmas during the Post Reformation period. Originally it wasn't even connected to the visit of the Magi; rather it focused upon the Incarnation–Jesus as God becoming a human.

The escape to Egypt connects Jesus to Moses and Jewish freedom. Jesus has come to save us just as Moses saved the Jews. Matthew says little about Jesus' birth. Most of his narrative focuses upon the visit of the Magi. In Chapter 2:11, Matthew tells of the house they visited. Jesus was probably 18 months to two years old at the time. The passage about the slaughter of the innocents is an indicator of his age. So, Matthew clearly puts the Magi's visit long after Jesus was born and tells us that the family is living in a home in Bethlehem.

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Operation Christmas Child
